AS A COUNSELOR group before camp, we do our best to plan out the best possible summer, but we are not quite capable of adding one key ingredient, \*LPC magic.\* That is something we can only source with the help of the campers, and boy did we. Days on the camp calendar that hung in the dining room went from loose plans, to anticipated adventures, and finally, to magical memories.

In a way that I've only ever seen happen in LPC, this magic reared its head throughout camp in a variety of ways. It carried the group morale on an overnight hike that stretched an already long day well

into the evening of bus station folk dancing, parking lot volleyball, and late night car shuttling. It existed throughout our three Chillydåg (Rest day) evening programs, where the campers shared poems, songs, and ill-fated acrobatics. Through it all, the group of once strangers gelled into a cohesive camp bound by shared exhaustion, arguably the perfect amount of beans, and a splash of magic.

In the second half of camp, we found that magic all over the place. In the delicious meals that campers brought from their home cultures, in the courses that brought joy, adventure, and creative expression, in the uncommonly consistent sunny

Some of the mealtime hits included traditional Polish pierogis, which took all day but managed to be on time for dinner, a true feast. The Spanish crew treated us to some classic Tortilla de Patatas. One of the American counselors brought out his best Hawaiian shirt to do some classic cookouts in the nice weather.

Campers especially enjoyed the visible mending courses, where they embroidered, altered, fixed, and generally made their clothes unique.

Exploration, nature photography, walk and talk, and other courses that got campers out into the surroundings were also particularly popular. Campers particularly loved sharing and learning about languages and cultures from each other's homes.

Whenever the sun comes out, the doors and windows open and the whole house embraces the beautiful surroundings. We could have meals on the lawn. We could sing on the front steps. We could take over the neighborhood sounds with our rowdy folk dancing. (I've never seen a camper group that loved folk dancing so much.)

Our three day hikes split us up into small groups for some varied

adventures. The B-Hike ventured up to the island of Tjörn for a couple days of coastal bicycling which featured a giant head sculpture, for some reason. The Viking hike ventured through the woods and eventually cowboy camped under the stars on the shore of a picturesque lake. The Pirate hike ended up spending less time on boats than expected, but made up for it with a classic teen film instead. Not quite as pirate themed, but a joy nonetheless.

As always, the last few days of camp were jampacked. We held a rowdy, sweet, and at times unprepared talent show that attracted the

attention of some of our neighbors. We made each other thoughtful and personal gifts for our secret Santa exchange, and we capped it all off with thoughtful deliberations of how to remember our time here with goodbye books and camp t-shirts.

Through it all, the LPC magic that the camp exuded never failed to bring joy to the campers, even in the toughest moments, and never failed to remind the staff why we love giving LPC everything we have each summer. We are so grateful. What a wonderful, wild ride.
