WORLD-WIDE LPC HUNT Zoom

HE WORLD-WIDE LPC HUNT WAS created to help keep the LPC spirit alive during the camp-less summer of 2020. The Hunt was a series of 5 weekly puzzles with an LPC theme, to be solved in Family groups by Hunters of all ages. Weekly Family Days, when the puzzles were solved, took place through Zoom meetings.

The Hunt encompassed a wonderfully diverse group of about 50 people, with ages spanning the tens to the seventies from 9 different countries. Several Hunters had been to more than 10 LPCs, and some had not yet been to camp.

The weekly puzzle themes were LPC classics: The Big Hike, The Daily Schedule, Places in Song, LPC History, and Putz Puzzle. The answers were all names of past camps.

The Hunt creators connected all the Families through their magical Attic website, which revealed clickable clues and links with LPC songs, recipes, photos, and much more.

Besides solving a puzzle, at Family Day each week people talked and got to know their Family members. These participants still hiked and Putzed and sang and danced.

The Hunt Finale was special, like Sunday Evening Program, with singing, dancing (Pata Pata!) and a video montage recapping the whole Hunt. Families also found the summer's missing camps, "in our hearts"! The Hunt ended with a chorus of "Good Night to You All" around a candle.

LOOKING BACK: Natalie's memories of early camps

UR FIFTH CAMP WAS IN A STRANGE AND AMAZING LITTLE town which had once been a metropolis on the salt route. We lived in the village schoolhouse, which had oiled floors that turned your bare feet black, which turned our sheets black.

The school director, who had arranged for us to use the schoolhouse that summer, lived in a villa in an overgrown park which reminded us of a Chekov play. A few eccentric ancients lived in the villa, too. We did our laundry in their cellar in a dank dark room where we built a fire under a huge pot in which we stirred our dirty sheets with a long wooden pole, then fished them out and rinsed them under an ice-cold tap. Did they get clean? I doubt it. Oberwölz was an adventure. **

"The most important day of camp for me was when a group of ex-campers, now counselors, came to me and said they would like to run a second camp next summer. This is what we always hoped for: the expansion of our work through the campers themselves. Armin and I will be having camp in America—a good site has been lent to us in Freedom, NH.

Next July the children in Europe [in Delft, Netherlands] and the children in New Hampshire will be playing many of the same games and singing many of the same songs. We will all be working for our common goal—and there will be 70 of us working for it instead of 35. Isn't that cause for celebration?"



CAMP BIRTHDAY August 1, 2020

HIS SUMMER, 150 PEOPLE FROM AROUND THE WORLD CAME together on Zoom to celebrate LPC. Counselors, campers, and directors of different ages, nationalities, and locales, had created home videos of LPC's regular activities to build a daily schedule we could all watch/experience together in two hours.

We woke up, brushed our teeth, had singing, putz pause and chose from courses as diverse as cooking, a tour of the Freedom house, folk dancing and a lesson in Arabic. Liana Brower asked us all to consider how racism is being brought to light in new ways in our communities, and how racism is present in LPC.

During Together Time we watched an interview with Natalie in which she described how LPC was started—it was very moving, and felt as if she was there with us. By the end it was clear that we were connected across distance and that we could do camp together, while physically apart.

BELIEVE IN THE POWER OF MUSIC TO UNITE US, GIVE US energy, and send a message around the world. I love music in LPC, and the emotions it brings us. I use my love of music to host a radio show as a hobby, and enjoy sharing those feelings with my listeners.

When the Corona pandemic began and we were all isolated at home, I decided that music could bring the LPC community together. In March I started a weekly two hour LPC Radio Show, playing familiar songs and camp hits, and taking requests. So many people came forward to help—by spreading the word among friends and on Facebook, by sharing rare recordings (it was so special to hear Armin Luethi leading a group in song again), sending in requests, and singing songs themselves.

Many LPCers tuned in—we averaged 65 people per show! I've had so much fun researching songs in French, Swedish, Swiss-German, Italian, Polish, Spanish, Estonian, and Dutch, and getting feedback from listeners.

It is funny to know that while I am doing the show on a Sunday night, closing my weekend, LPC Radio is playing during other people's breakfast or lunch—LPC is truly a worldwide organization. Hosting the show has made me feel deeply connected to our community in this strange and difficult year, and has proven once again the strength of music to unite us. LPC COOKBOOK: SWEDISH CHOCOLATE BALLS



3 dl. (100 g.) oats 11/2 cups

100 g. margarine (or butter) 1/2 cup 1.5 dl. (125 g.) sugar ½ cup + 2 Tosp.

1 1/2 Tbsp. cocoa

1 Tbsp. vanilla powder 1 tsp. Vanilla Extract instant coffee to taste

Mix all ingredients together well. Make balls. Options: roll in sugar, oats, grated coconut, or chocolate powder. Makes up to 20. Refrigerate 2 hours
